TALK – Matthew 18.21-35: The Challenge of Forgiveness

In our Gospel reading for today, we find Peter wrestling with the challenge of forgiveness. He is trying to work out how many times is an appropriate number of times to have to forgive someone – is there a limit for forgiveness? Perhaps it's seven times? But as Jesus explains, we shouldn't keep score when it comes to forgiveness. God is always generous in extending forgiveness towards us. God's grace and mercy has no limit. And so, we must do the same when it comes to forgiving others.

To help demonstrate his point, Jesus tells the parable we just heard about a servant who owed the King a lot of money but couldn't afford to pay off his debt. The servant begs the King for mercy, and the King generously cancels the debt. But although the servant experiences mercy from the King, he fails to show the same mercy to a friend who owes him a sum of money. The servant has his friend thrown in prison until he can pay the servant back his money. The King catches wind of this and is very angry at the servant for not showing mercy to others. As a consequence, the King undoes his cancelling of the original debt and throws the servant in prison until he can repay the King. Jesus warns us that this is how God will treat us, unless we forgive others sincerely from our hearts.

This is heavy stuff! But it's also really important...forgiveness is at the very heart of Jesus's teaching, and learning to forgive as God has forgiven us is an essential aspect of what it means to live as a follower of Jesus. When Jesus taught the disciples how to pray, he said we should pray that God would 'forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us'. We pray that every Sunday, don't we...many of us pray it every day. It

reminds us that *being* forgiven and *giving* forgiveness go hand in hand. If we want to know God's forgiveness, we've got to show it to others.

But as I'm sure many of us have experienced, real and proper forgiveness is not always easy! Especially when we feel hurt, or angry or betrayed. And proper forgiveness is usually not just a one-off decision — it's an ongoing choice. As Martin Luther King Jr. said, 'forgiveness is a constant attitude'. We've got to keep on choosing the way of forgiveness.

And we all need forgiveness – none of us are perfect, we all get things wrong in our relationships with each other, and with God. God knows that and he still loves us unconditionally – no matter how much we mess up, when we ask for mercy God is always generous in showing us forgiveness. He just asks that we also show that same generosity in forgiving others.

The reality is, every time we refuse to forgive someone or withhold forgiveness, we usually end up hurting ourselves more than the other person. But when we choose to forgive, we share something of the love and grace that God has shown us. We grow more into the people God created us to be.

The kind of forgiveness that Jesus calls us to is not wishy washy. It's not about pretending we're not hurt or denying there's a problem. It's not about staying in situations that our bad for us. Real forgiveness goes deeper than just the idea of 'forgive and forget'. So, we don't use forgiveness as an excuse to ignore or dismiss a very real problem that might need addressing. Sometimes confrontation is needed, but only if it's driven by a desire for forgiveness and reconciliation, rather than out of spite or revenge. But the kind of forgiveness Jesus speaks about is freely given

 even if the person who has wronged us hasn't apologised or even admitted there's a problem. Real forgiveness is freely given, not earned – and God has given us the gift of his Holy Spirit to help us do it.

For me, one of the hardest things I've had to forgive is something someone did to hurt me over 10 years ago. And this person has never apologised to me. I found that hard – they never really took responsibility for what they did. But that doesn't mean I shouldn't forgive them. It took me around a year to begin to deal with the pain of my hurt in a way that meant I could even start to forgive this person. And at first it was really hard - I kept taking back my forgiveness and clinging to how wrong I thought the person had been. Several times a day I would have to choose to forgive this person. And because this person never apologised to me, all my pain and unforgiveness would come up in my relationship with God. It made me feel trapped. And the truth was, my unforgiveness was hurting me way more than the other person who was happily carrying on with their life. But over time, and with lots of prayer and help from God, I came to a place where I was ready and able to forgive the person that hurt me. It was definitely a process – not a one-off magical moment of forgiveness. But it brought me so much freedom and healing in my own heart when I was able to choose to forgive this person.

Theologian Tom Wright says that forgiveness is a bit like the air in our lungs – there's only room for us to inhale the next lungful when we've just breathed out the previous one. If we insist on withholding it, refusing to give someone the kiss of life that they really need, we won't be able to take in any more air, and we'll suffocate. That's a bit like how I felt when I couldn't forgive the person who had hurt me. It was keeping me prisoner,

stopping me from breathing. But choosing to forgive can bring us freedom and healing. And when we are open and willing and able to forgive others, we also become more open to receiving God's love and forgiveness for ourselves. And that is only ever good for us.

So, as we come into land, let's take a moment to pause and reflect: How easy do we find it to forgive those who hurt us?

What stops us from saying 'sorry' or 'I forgive vou'?

Is there a person or a situation where we need to choose to forgive?

Perhaps there's something that feels too big or too hard to forgive right now. But maybe we're in a place where we could say we want to forgive, or even that we want to want to forgive. Talk to God about that. Pray about those feelings. That's an important step in itself, and God is patient in helping us learn to forgive, even if it takes a while.

As Jesus told Peter, there is no limit to how many times we should forgive those who wrong us. Forgiveness is freely given and not earned. In Jesus, God offers us unlimited forgiveness when we ask him for it, and none of us truly deserve that. And so, as we receive God's gracious, generous forgiveness, let us not be like the servant in the story who refused to show mercy to others even when they had experienced such mercy from the King. As we live as God's forgiven people, with the help of his Holy Spirit, let us be generous in showing that same forgiveness to others.
